ever been preached or written on the evi-
dences of Christianity.

Christ leads his people not as sol-
diers are led, compact in a body to service;
not as a crowd is led, furious and excited;
but like a flock, which opens and disperses
itself, each feeding according to its several
will, among green pastures, or by the side
of gentle streams, and yet the Shepherd
watches them still.

What a beautiful sight it is to be-
hold the aged Christian at the close of his
career, retiring like the resplendent sun be-
neath the wave; giving promise, in the in-
creased richness of his graces, and bright-
ness of his example, that his rising again
shall be amidst the glories of eternity.

people more than poverty, or the fear of po-
verty; but, like all other ills that flesh is
heir to, it has its antidote, its reliable reme-
dy. The judicious application of industry,
prudence and temperance is a certain cure.
