**How to Increase a Congregation.**

Here, now, is an opportunity—not for the minister alone, nor for him in special partnership with the deacons and those two or three brethren who "speak in meeting"—but for the church as a whole, and in every one of its members, to do good.

But if the members conclude that these persons once drawn within the walls of the sanctuary, are sufficiently cared for, and that the ministers must do the rest—if they think that a few vague and general prayers for the salvation of sinners generally, for a "blessing on the word preached," for "the building up of the church in numbers as well as in graces," and such like, exhaust their duty and privilege of prayer, they will have no reason to wonder if they continue to have a small congregation. They do not exhibit a fitness to be entrusted with a larger one.

John Brown, of Haddington, said to a young minister who complained of the smallness of his congregation, "It is as large a one as you will want to give account for in the day of judgment." The admonition is appropriate, and not to ministers alone.—*Examiner.*
