

THE FAITH THAT CANNOT GROW OLD.—Other religions become sickly exotics when you transplant them from their birthplace; change of climate is fatal to their constitution. Christianity takes root in every soil; it flourishes in every climate. You cannot plant Mohammedanism in China, or Confucianism in Turkey; the subtle system of Hinduism will not do for the untutored mind of the African. But, thank God, Christianity is alike adapted to all. Other systems are content to slumber within their own territory; they make no attempt to acquire dominion over that which is the proper sphere of religion, the kingdom of mind. Christianity aims at and avows its intention of completing the conquest of the world. In distant parts of the earth, its banner is now waving the sign of hope to the nations. Other religions, after they exist for a century or two, give signs of inaction and feebleness. The strength of Christianity grows with its years; it is not subject to the wasting influence of time; age brings with it no feebleness; centuries write no wrinkles on its brow. It is eighteen hundred years old, and the dew of its youth is upon it.

CATHOLIC STATISTICS.—From the following summary, which we compile from the report received from the Most Rev. and Right Rev. Bishops, it appears that there are at present in the United States 2,386 churches, and 1,128 stations and chapels, making an aggregate of 3,513 places of Catholic worship. There are 2,235 priests, according to the reports of the past year, showing an increase of 127 over the number of the previous year.

M. E. CHURCH.—By a summary of the Conferences, taken from the just published minutes, we learn that the total increase in the Methodist Episcopal Church, North, for the past year was 17,790, making the present total membership of the church 532,657. There were 9,845 deaths.

REVIVALS.—The revival in Wales still continues with great power. In the county of Cardiganshire alone, about 15,000 have been added to the churches in nine months.

It is stated that a powerful religious movement is now taking place in the northern parts of Bohemia, where whole villages are going over to Protestantism.
