An excellent road from the Dalles to Fort Sincoe passes directly through our valley, which is distant from the former place fourteen miles, when you strike what s termed the Swale, a strip of country twenty miles in length, and one-half to two miles in width, the soil of which is a rich allovial deposit from the hills, and for agricultural purposes is without doubt as good as can be found east of the Cascade mountains. Seven miles further on you reach Clickatat Creek, and all along its bottom may be found soil equally as rich as the Three miles further you arrive at the Block House country, which is settled by several families, and has its advantages good water and timber close at hand. Oak for fire-wood and posts, pine and fir for joicing, in abundance, distant from one to twelve miles, according to the location of claims. Creeks and springs are numerons, affording copious supplies of pure wa-ter for stock and other purposes.

At this time plows are running in every direction, and have been for the past two weeks. Some seed is already sown. Outs will be the crop this season. Vegetables will without doubt grow to perfection, and fruit will succeed as well or better than in your famous valley. Several orchards are already planted, and the capacities of the soil for grain and vegetables will be thoroughly tested the present season. Hay may be made in several parts of the valley from the grasses which grow wild.

For raising stock of every description I doubt if this valley is excelled by any on the Pacific coast. The whole country to the tops of the mountains on either side of the valley is covered with "bunch" grass, which years of grazing will fail to exhaust, The past winter is said to have been a hard one" by those who have been here for several years, yet stock suffered but little without food and very few were lostnot a dozen in the whole valley.

A saw-mill is nearly completed, and within thirty days will be sawing lumber. Water-power is never-failing here, and sufficient for all milling purposes the wants of the country may require.

As to the healthfulness of the country, there is but one unqualified opinion, and that is that a healthier country does not lie under the sun, and the ruddy cheeks and healthy appearance of the old residents carry ample proof that the opinion cannot be a mistaken one, and will be sustained.

Mr. Editor, this is a plain, unadorned statement of the capabilities and advantages of our valley, and without wishing to induce any to leave your beautiful State, we seek to attract to our neighborhood such of those restless spirits as may have determined to better their fortunes in a new country. To such we would sav, come over from the Dalles and look for yoursilves, and last but not least, do not let the tales of interested persons about the Dalles prevent you from making the trip. The latch-string hangs out at every cabin door, and you will find our people hospitable and willing to furnish all information that you can desire about the country here and JOHN NELSON.
