

Clackamas County Agricultural Society. This Society met at the court-house in Oregon City on Saturday, April 28, 1860, at two o'clock P. M.

The Secretary read the following CONSTITUTION. Art. 1. This Society shall be called the Clackamas County Agricultural Society, and its object shall be the promotion of the mechanical and industrial arts.

Art. 2. The officers of this Society shall be a President, First and Second Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and an Executive Committee consisting of five members, all of whom shall be elected annually and retain their offices till their successors are elected.

Art. 3. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Society, call meetings with the advice and at the request of the Executive Committee, and perform such other duties as may be required.

Art. 4. The Secretary shall keep a faithful record of all the proceedings of the Society, procure all necessary books and papers, and attend to all correspondence.

Art. 5. The Treasurer shall receive and pay for all moneys paid to him, and pay out for all moneys paid to him, and pay out for all moneys paid to him, and pay out for all moneys paid to him.

Art. 6. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to supervise and direct the operations of the Society, to draw on the Treasurer for all funds, to examine and audit all accounts and claims against the Society, and to make such other provisions as they may deem proper for the purpose of accomplishing the objects of the Society.

Art. 7. There shall be an annual meeting of the Society to be held at the court-house, or such other place as the Executive Committee may direct, on the last Tuesday in April, at which time the officers shall be elected.

Art. 8. Any citizen of Clackamas county may become a member of this Society by paying the Treasurer three dollars and signing the Constitution, and shall be entitled to compete for premiums at any Fair of the Society.

Art. 9. There shall be a Fair held annually in this county under the direction of the Executive Committee, at such place and time as they may designate, at which time all articles intended for exhibition shall be entered upon the books of the Secretary at least one day before the exhibition, and no articles entered shall be removed unless by permission of the Committee.

Art. 10. The Committee shall have power to appoint judges to award premiums on articles presented whose decision shall be final; and any person claiming a premium for the produce of any field of grain or vegetables, shall present a fair specimen of the same, and verify the amount of production by the affidavits of two disinterested witnesses.

Art. 11. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the Society. AMENDMENT TO ART. 11.—On motion of Wm. Barlow, voted: The Constitution cannot be altered the first year except by a vote of two thirds of all the members of the Society.

On motion of Mr. Barlow, the Constitution was adopted. On motion of Dr. Steele a Committee of five was appointed to arrange order of business for the election of officers.

Dr. Steele, Seth Linnell, W. Barlow, A. B. Holcomb, and H. Straight were appointed on committee. The committee reported as follows: President—A. L. Lovejoy; Vice President—J. R. Robb; 2d do., Hiram Straight; Secretary—Wm. Abernethy; Treasurer—A. H. Steele; Executive Committee—Samuel Miller, Henry Miller, Wm. Barlow, Philip Foster, and Maxwell Ramsay.

The Executive Committee shall establish such rules as may be necessary to conduct the regular meetings, and all matters for the government of the annual Fair. On motion of J. S. Rinearson, the report of the committee was adopted.

On motion of Wm. Barlow, voted that the Constitution and proceedings be furnished the Argus and Farmer. Wm. Abernethy, Sec'y.
