rather be a nigger at the South than a poor laborer at the North." There is no accounting for taste or ambition, but the free citigens of Linn county among whom he lives must in his view lead a surry life, if even Delasion can see anything preferable in a life of negro slavery. We hope they will ask him next week what he meant by making such a comparison. He may be so lazy asterally that he prefers an idle nigger's life with a master to support him to the patient industry of the honest working man, or he may have been somebody's nigger so long that he likes it. We commend him to the tender mercies of his fellow citizens, who will now understand how he esteems and loves them, and if they have the same opinion that is entertained here since his speech, we think the result in Linn will show that his neighbors don't care how soon he seeks some decent master, if he will only take himself away from the despised society of Northern laborers, whom he rates below niggers.

DELESION'S AMERICAN. On Thursday, Smith said in his speech, " That he had rather be a decent man's nigger at the South, than a poor white laborer at the North." Think of that, working men of Oregon. This demagogue, who wants Oregon. your votes, spurns you, and thinks the nixger's situation preferable to yours, if you are poor. Will you support him even indirectly by voting for Kelly, Post, Officer, and Foster, all of whom will make him a Senator if a caucus nominates him. The idea is natural to a pro-slavery Democrat. that labor is degrading. Senator Hammond called the Northern laborers t' e mud. sills of seciety, and Delazon Smith thinks them beneath and below decent slave ho! der's niggers. We hope that those who live by bonest labor will remember at The polls that a vote for the candidates of the Democracy may elevate their slanderer, and that they will rebuke him most distinetly. Let him be Jo Lane's or any body's nigger, but make him understand that even if poor you are too independent to be willing to change places with him, or to promote his political advancement.

We hear that the wool-grower himself is giving it up, so far as his chances are concerned.
