Garibaldi was organizing for efforts on the mainland of Italy. He had issued orders for a conscription. It was rumored that 2,000 Garibaldians, under Melici, had landed at Catanzaro in Calabria.

The Sicilian Parliament was about to assemble, and decree the forfeiture of the rights of the Bourbons, and the union of Sicily to Sardinia.

The royal conference at Baden was dissolved on the 17th of June. Napoleon returned to Paris on the 18th. The French and Prussian journals declare that the peace of Europe is now consolidated.

Another massacre of Christians had taken place at Mount Lebanon. The Turkish soldiers set to protect them joined the Drones in the massacre. Twenty-six villas were burned.

LATER.—Garibaldi had held a Council-of-War, and determined to march against Messina on the 27th of June. The evacuation of Palermo was complete.

The correspondent of the London Times says that a band of brigands had gone to Sicily to assassinate Garibaldi.

The damage by the bombardment of Palermo by the Neapolitans amounted to \$10,000,000. One hundred dead bodies had been discovered in the ruins.

The Neapolitan Government offered to restore the two American vessels captured; but the American minister demanded reparation for the insult to the American flag.

The Neapolitan Council has resolved to grant a constitution and general amnesty, a total change of Ministry and a free press.

It was reported that the Russian and Spanish legations had threatened to withdraw, unless Sardinia stopped the expeditions to Sicily.

Jerome Bonaparte, the youngest brother of the great Napoleon, is dead, at the age of 73.

The Prince of Wales will sail for Canada on the 11th July. Napoleon will visit Savoy in July.

THE NEW YORK HERALD AND THE PRESIDENTIAL PROSPECTS.

The New York Herald, in an article on the Presidential prospects, says: As long as the Democracy were a unit, their strength in the Southern States was almost impregnable.

It is hard to say in which of these twelve States the Democracy can be successful; and, what is the most disheartening feature in the dark prospect is, that the Democratic candidate who is likely to poll the most votes at the North will poll least at the South.

There is, therefore, a political revolution at hand, which will scatter the Democracy like chaff before the wind. Had there been two Democratic candidates in the field in the Presidential struggle of 1856, a similar result would have happened.

An act making appropriations for the construction of certain military roads in the Territory of Washington.

An act to authorize the President of the United States, in conjunction with the State of California, to run and mark the necessary lines between the Territories of the United States and the State of California.
