This arrangement would doubtless be very disagreeable to the Ecclesiastical Government, and could hardly be accepted by King Francis II. without interfering with the noted piety of that mon-

I would say that I have had in mill previous to this a machine that cut the grain very much, but this does not cut a kernel, and does not require half the power. Your machine will certainly take the preference in this State, and I would say on the Pacific coast.
