European Intelligence.

The steamship "Glasgow," with dates from Queenstown, Ireland, to the 8th November, has arrived.

Fifteen thousand Neapolitan troops, with horses and field pieces, were pursued by the Sardinians, and took refuge in the Papal States, where they were arrested by the French troops there. They were to be disarmed.

After the fall of Gaeta, Garibaldi will retire into private life.

LATER. - The steamship Africa, with Liverpool dates to November 10th, has arrived. Victor Emanuel has formally accepted the sovereignty of Naples.

Garibuldi has resigned the dictatorship and departed for his " Island home." The dissolution of the Pope's general army was positive. He will have left only a simple guard of 3,000 men.

EASTERN ELECTIONS .- In Maryland, official returns have been received from nearly every county, and the full vote will not vary from the following results: Belt, 37.613; Breckinridge, 38.323; Donglas 5.345. Majority for Breekinridge, 710; majority of Bell and Douglas combined our Breckinridge, 4,635. The vote for Lincoln, so far as assertained in the State, is 3,206; in Baltimore city he received 1,-

In New Jersey, the official vote has been declared. The following are the elected electors: Wm Cook, Democrat;---Joel Parker, Democrat; Theodore Runyan, Democrat; Joseph Houblower, Republican; Charles E. Elmer, Republican; Edward W. Jones, Republican; Isanc R. Scalder, Republican. The three Douglas Democrats are elected by 3,000 to 4,000 majority. The straight Donglas ticket car ried just enough votes from Vroom, Wurtz, Bondict and Brewer, to defeat them .-Brewer and Wurtz are defeated by some 1,500, while the others lose it by from 100 to 300. In some parts of the State people voted as though news of the fusion had never reached them. Take all the vote together, there is a majority of from 3,000 to 4,000 against Lincoln.—Sac. Union.
