Postscript!

Latest News by Pony and Telegraph.

War preparations!

Just as we were going to press, we received (by the stage) the Jacksonville Sentinel Extra, of Feb. 2, containing the following highly important news by telegraph:

The Pony Express reached Fort Churchill Jan. 30, at 8 P. M., with special dispatches to the 14th.

St. Louis, Jan. 12. It is reported that the President is determined to purge the Executive Departments of every one who preaches secession.

Military movements are still progressing at Washington for the protection of the Capitol. Three companies of flying artillery arrived Jan. 8th, and two companies of marines immediately after.

A meeting was held in New York, Jan. 9, to organize a military force to be in readiness for the call of the Government to sustain the laws. A large number of names were enrolled.

Captain Randolph of the Navy has resigned.

A company of marines, with fifty muskets, took possession of Fort McHenry, Jan. 9. Active measures were in progress for the defence of Fort Monroe.

Senator Hunter made a speech declaring that it was too late to save the present Union, and said it was necessary for parties to reconstruct a new and more enduring one out of the fragments of this. His speech produced a deep sensation.

The Alabama secession ordinance passed Jan. 11, by a vote of 61 to 39. It invites the slave States to meet in Convention at Montgomery on Feb. 4, to consult as to the most effectual mode of insuring peace.

The Florida Convention passed a secession ordinance on the 10th, by 62 to 7.

Let John's resolution was amended in the New York Senate, declaring that treason as defined in the Constitution really exists in one or more States; the resolution passed by a vote of 38 to 1, and was immediately telegraphed to the President.

The annual anti-slavery meeting was held by order of the Governor of Florida, on the pretext of the offer in command removing arms.

It is said that the Federal troops have abandoned all the forts on Pensacola harbor except Fort Pickens, where three hundred men are stationed.

Baton Rouge was surrendered to 600 Louisiana troops, after a parley between Maj. Hawkins and the Governor.

Lieut. Talbot had arrived at Washington, with dispatches from Maj. Anderson, and reported the condition of Fort Sumpter less favorable than was thought by the Government.

It is reported that the Administration is determined to send abundant supplies at all risks.

At Norfolk yesterday, a steamer took powder from the Federal Magazine and put to sea. Her destination was held secret.

The President has ordered the Government patronage from the Constitution, consequent upon an assault on him for having ordered reinforcements to Charleston.

Letter writers report a difficulty between Gen. Scott and Senator Toombs.—At a dinner party on the 10th, Toombs expressed the hope that the people of Charleston would sink the Star of the West. Scott asked if it was possible that as an American he desired such an event? Toombs replied in the affirmative, and added, those who sent her should be sunk with her. A challenge has passed between them.

The New York Times correspondent says the President will veto the Pacific Railroad Bill if passed, not from objection to the measure, but because of the great debt created, and the present condition of the country.

St. Louis, Jan. 14.—10 P. M. The Star of the West arrived safely back to New York. No person was injured.

A Charleston dispatch says that the sloop of war Brooklyn had arrived off the harbor; that disaffection existed among the troops at Fort Sumpter; and that its evacuation is contemplated.

Col. Hayne on behalf of South Carolina, and Lieut. Hall of Fort Sumpter, had started for Washington.

John A. Dix is confirmed as Secretary of the Treasury.

It is rumored that Gen. W. O. Butler, of Kentucky, is Secretary of War.

The Ohio Legislature passed resolutions tendering the aid of the State to the General Government to support the laws, if needed.

THE session of the College year commences on the third Monday of November. The commencement exercises are held on the 4th of July, when the yearly vacation ensues.

FACULTY. L. L. Rowland, President, Professor of the Greek and Hebrew Languages, Moral and Intellectual Philosophy, Rhetoric, and Logic. John H.
