

**About Bedbugs.**—According to an article in the last number of Harper's Magazine, bed-bugs are an American invention, and have been exported from this country to all parts of Europe, excepting Ireland, where a bed bug is never to be found. The insect made its appearance in England as early as 1503, when two noblemen were "punished" by them, and the physicians called in great haste. The bug is a parasite of the bat family; and is so tenacious of life that no degree of cold or heat can affect it. Freeze one till you can break it in two; thaw the pieces and they will revive. Freeze the eggs until congealed in ice; let them thaw and they will hatch again as usual. Boil both insect and egg, and they will revive as soon as cool. If they can get nothing to eat they will live and propagate on what nourishment they may derive from the atmosphere.
