OREGON CITY, March 11.

Exports.—During the week two steamers have left—the Pacific for San Francisco and the Santa Cruz for Victoria. The exports were:

Per Pacific—3700 boxes apples; 7800 sacks flour; 11 hales wool; 50 cases bacon; 288 hids, 36 hales deer skins; 9 tubs fish oil; 10 sacks timothy seed, and 50 pkgs assorted merchandise.

Per Santa Cruz—1200 sks flour; 15 cases bacon; 30 boxes apples; 80 boxes eggs; 25 kgs butter; 3 kgs lard; 2,000 fruit trees, and 60 head stock.—Advertiser.

The Alabama Senate, on the 18th, we see by a letter in a Mobile contemporary, "was principally occupied with a discussion of a new rule, to prohibit smoking in the Senate chamber when the Senate was in session!"
