It is perfectly simple in its construction, and not liable to get out of order; it is easily unadjusted, and does away with the hard manual labor of sowing grain—doing the same amount of labor in two hours that could be done in one day by the ordinary method of sowing. The machine can be carried while being used, as it weighs but five pounds, or, by a simple frame, it can be attached to a wagon. When it is carried, it is strapped on the body of the operator, a strap to go across the right shoulder and under the left arm, also a strap buckled around the body, and a strap from the top of the sack, around the neck. 


