Postscript!

Reported Capture of Ft. Pickens!

SACRAMENTO, May 6th, 1861. Pony arrived today with dates to the 26th ult. The Portsmouth Transcript of Tuesday, says that dispatches received that night say that Fort Pickens was taken by the Southern troops, with a loss of 2,500 men.

Arrangements were made to carry troops from Charleston to Richmond; 2000 men on their way. A gentleman from Washington, via Relay House, reported that the secessionists had planted a battery of four guns at Harper's Ferry, commanding the bridge. Trains are stopped and examined, all the roads are lined with soldiers.

At Wheeling, a strong Union feeling prevails, 2,500 men were under arms. All is quiet at Baltimore, all the wholesale houses are closed, and all the clerks over fourteen years of age were required to enlist, many are leaving in consequence. Five cars arrived at Chambersburg filled with families from Baltimore. Baltimore money is five per cent. below par. Pennsylvania money is being exchanged for gold and silver.

The schooner Lucas was fired into in Chesapeake Bay by two schooners, which had no colors, but escaped. The N. Y. Union Committee has purchased sixteen rifled cannon for the use of the volunteers. Engraved notes and bonds for the Confederate States have been seized, in two bank note engraving establishments in Wall street. The Cunard steamer 'Kedar' has been chartered by the Government. Also, the steamer 'Champion.'

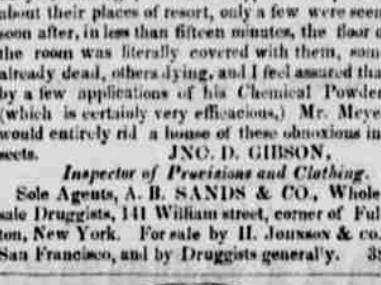
