

**GARFIELD NOMINATED.**—The Democratic Convention which has been in session at Vancouver this week, nominated S. Garfield, Esq., as Delegate to Congress from Washington Territory. It Stevens, Judge Strong, and Columbia Lancaster, were all very discreetly laid on the shelf. Mr. Garfield we understand to be a Union man, and his nomination is a triumph over the secession sentiment, which is said to be strong among the would-be leaders of Democracy in Washington Territory. If Mr. Garfield is as truly a man as we have supposed him to be, his election will not set the Union cause back any in Washington Territory.

**The Right Gait.**—The Sacramento Bee reports the rumor that a squad of secessionists is about organizing in California to go South to help the rebels. We hope the rumor is correct, though we doubt it much.
