

A dispatch from the South of April 19 says there is great wonder that no disunion party has yet been developed in the North, and there is "expectation daily of hearing that the masses of New York will inaugurate a bloody rebellion and overthrow the authorities. They have probably found out their mistake long before this time.

WHISTLING FOR THE UNION.—At the Union meeting held at Salem recently, the whole crowd of nearly two hundred persons joined in whistling that good old patriotic air, "Yankee Doodle." This is the latest style of patriotism, and it seems to show the spirit of the people just as well as if the air had been performed by a full band.

The census returns reveal the astonishing fact that Hancock county, situated in the "Pan Handle" of Virginia, has lost one third, or a fraction more than thirty-three per cent, of its slave population within the last ten years. In 1850 there were three slaves in the county; now there are only two. Should this rate of decrease be maintained, there will not be a slave in the county in 1880.

TRAITORISM REBUKED.—Many of the streets in Stockton were named in honor of those who attained high rank in the service of their country. Now, the original owner of that city has sent a petition to the Common Council, asking that the name of "Triggs street" be changed to "Anderson street."
