-A man in Ross county, Ohlo, states that he had made last season, from watermelons grown on one acre of ground, 18 barrels of syrup, which sold for 80 cents a gallon—giving \$460 for the acre of land and the labor. The process is as follows: "Take only the soft part of the melon, rub it through a wire sieve into a barrel, then strain out the juice in a copper kettle, just as you would cider or maple sugar water, and be careful not to scorch it when nearly done."

-The Buffalo Advertiser says: A gentleman returned from the Cattaraugus Reservation states that the Indians held a grand council and unanimously resolved to organize an Indian regiment to serve in defense of the United States Government during the approaching war. Another council will be held to-morrow in order to perfect measures for forming companies immediately. All the red skins on the tract are very enthusiastic.

-The Petersburg (Va.) Express says that Jeff, Duvis, Col. J. B. Magruder, Col. R. E. Lee, Lieut, M. F. Maury and Vice President Stephens will hold a con-aultation in the city of Washington at a very early day. The St. Louis Democrat adds: "We shouldn't wonder if they did, with a sheriff each side of them, a priest in front, and a slip noose just above their heads. And may the Lord have mercy on their souls."

-The N. Y. World thinks that when the Stars and Stripes went down at Sum-ter it was the signal for the elevation of the still undishonored ensign on a million of dagstaffs from Maine to Oregon. When the seventy surrendered to the seven thousand, twerty millions of people with one voice declared that not a star should be stricken out, or a stripe crased from its honored folds.

-The Irish Pictorial, the organ of the adopted citizens of Boston, calls the Irish to arms in defence of the Government and the Union, and to punish the traitors who have attacked Ft. Sumter, and for the overthrow of the Southern oligarcy.

-The first recognition of the Southern Confederacy has been by a Havana cigar maker, whose wrappers contain a represen-tation of the Confederate flag. This is both emblematic and appropriate, as its end will be in smoke.

-The devout allusions to a protecting Providence in nearly all of Maj. ANDERson's modest letters, show that he is as humble a christian as he is a true soldier, and honorable man
