

THE WEATHER.—The present season has been the most remarkable for rain ever known in Oregon. Instead of turning warm and dry in April, as is usual, the rainy season has lasted up to the present week. Since the middle of March we have not had to exceed two weeks of clear days altogether. What time it has not been pouring down in torrents, it has generally been either misty or cloudy. The consequences is, that the roads are very muddy, and communication between different sections by land is disagreeable in Oregon and Washington Territory. The grass and vegetation are of course enormous, and the cold chilling rains have damaged the spring crops in appearance, while the early wheat threatens to attain such a growth of straw as to endanger its heading. The fact is, if we don't have summer soon, our prospects for a harvest will be anything but promising.

SERVED HIM RIGHT.—The N. Y. Herald of June 1st, says that the first case of violence in New York, having a fatal result, growing out of the present war excitement and the Southern rebellion, occurred last night, on which occasion Henry Merritt and John Swain being engaged in a discussion in the house No 199 Prince street, the latter gave expression to violent secessionist sentiments, and was instantly shot dead by Merritt. Merritt is a member of Warren Hose Company, No. 33.

SCABBY SHEEP.—On visiting the Clatsop Plains a few days since, we noticed that the scab was prevalent among the sheep. We were told that this disease was generally prevalent among the flocks.
