THE collegiate year, consisting of one term of nine months, will commence on the first Wednesday of November.

It is the design of this Institution to furnish a thorough and complete collegiate education.

There is a Library of 1000 volumes for the use of the students.

Applicants for admission to college must have a knowledge of the common English branches, and have studied the ancient languages so far as to have read portions of Cæsar and Cicero and the Greek Reader.

The tuition fee is \$32 per annum.

Students fitting for college, as well as others wishing to pursue collegiate studies without entering upon the college course, will be under the instruction of the college teachers.

The full term of 11 weeks in the preparatory department commences on the 2d Wednesday of September. Tuition, \$8 per term.

TUALATIN ACADEMY.

Tualatin Academy, for the coming year, will be under the direction and instruction of the College Professors, with such assistant instructors as they may find necessary to carry it forward efficiently and successfully.

The full term will commence on Wednesday, Sept. 19, to continue eleven weeks.

Tuition—Common branches, \$5; higher, \$8. A small additional charge will be made for fuel, &c. Instruction in Painting EXTRA, to such as receive it.

N. B.—The collegiate and the collegiate preparatory departments will commence on Wednesday, the 31st of October, at the commencement of the last half of the academic term, at which time Pres. Marsh is expected, with competent assistant teachers from the East, to be ready to take his place in the Institution.

Prof. Lyman, with the assistance of Mrs. C. E. ANSON, will carry forward the academic department till the return of Pres. Marsh. 21tf
