

**URGENT PREPARATIONS FOR WAR.**  
New York State alone has now in the field and in various camps of instruction, near Washington and Albany, 120,000 men, all uniformed, armed, and in a fine state of efficiency. The navy, too, is being rapidly augmented, and by the time the cold weather sets in immense bodies of troops will be sent down the coast and occupy every seaport, town and city in the several States, while a moving column of 80,000 men will be sent down the Mississippi; 150,000 into Virginia and Tennessee, and 50,000 retained about Washington and the Potomac. The preparations for the winter campaign are of the most gigantic character, eclipsing even the military pageantry of wars of the first empire, under the first Napoleon.

**TOUCHING INCIDENT.**—The following touching incident is given in a letter from a young officer in the Second Rhode Island Regiment: "After the battle was fought, I went into a grove where the Secessionists had been concealed. I found the ground covered with the dead and dying. The sight was that I pray never to see again. One poor fellow, with his leg blown off, called me to him and asked me to shake hands with him. He then asked me if I had any ill feelings towards him. I replied: 'No; but I am sorry that brothers should be obliged to slaughter each other in this manner.' The poor fellow burst into tears, and said he came from Georgia, and that they would have shot him in his own house if he had not come. I saw many heart-rending scenes, too numerous to mention."

**A PICKED REGIMENT.**—Such a Regiment as Col. Berlan's never was before formed in the world. Armed with the target rifle, some of them shooting 600 feet off-hand better than at a rest, with a leader who on Saturday made a string of 22 inches in a high wind, with a strange rifle and distance of 1,000—what may not be reasonably expected? All the loyal States have furnished each one company, which will rendezvous at Weehawken to practice their peculiar drill. Examinations are being conducted there now by the Colonel's agent, Mr. I. Smith Brown. The New York company is about full. The examination is very strict, only about one out of twenty being admitted on an average.—*N. Y. Tribune, July 31.*

**NEZ PERCE.**—Mr. G. C. Robbins, who returned from the Nez Perce's mines last Friday, gives us the following: About 2,500 practical miners are at work on Rhoads' Creek, Oro Fino, Canal Gulch, and French Creek. Nearly all are doing well. There are also four or five thousand men who make a living some other way—many of whom are leaving for the South Fork of Clearwater, where new and rich discoveries have been made. Mr. Robbins, after an examination, gives it as his opinion, that the miners take out \$60,000 worth of gold dust weekly. The old California miners say the gold is there.—*Oregonian.*

**PACIFIC RAILROAD BILL.**—On the 18th ult. in the U. S. Senate, Hon. Milton S. Latham presented a Pacific Railroad Bill, "so carefully prepared," says a telegram from Washington, "as to obviate all objections made last winter to this great measure." The bill will be considered at the next session.

**ANOTHER HEROINE.**—Mrs. Katy Brownell, daughter of the 1st Rhode Island Regiment, accompanied the Regiment to Bull's Run. She was fired at a good many times, but escaped injury. One man, in his determination to kill her, pursued her for some distance, when she turned and shot him dead, and, fleeing to the woods, escaped.

—In the Battle of Bull's Run, Henry Benson, of Kenosha County, Wis., fought gallantly with his regiment, the 2d Wisconsin. He was first shot through the hand, and exclaimed "There goes one hand for the Union. Rally, boys, and stick with the traitors!" Just then a ball struck him near the heart. He died, exclaiming, "Tell my father I die like a man, fighting for the Union."

—There was a Fourth of July celebration at St. Petersburg, the feature of which was an observation made by an enthusiastic patriot, who was aware that a number of gentlemen of Southern birth were present, to the effect that if any Secessionists were about they could be accommodated with a fight, without the slightest delay or inconvenience.

—Col. Wm. T. Sherman, of Ohio, is appointed and confirmed a Brigadier General of the Regular Army.
