Details of Bastern News.

A dispatch dated Quincy, Ill., Sept, 5th, says: A man just arrived at Shelbina, Mo, reported there was a fight at that place on Saturday, between Gen. Hurlbut's forces and some 1200 or 1500 State treated westward. Green has two cannon planted at Salt River, commanding the bridge, and intends raking any train conveying soldiers that attempt to cross it -The track is torn up in several places.

Gen. Grant telegraphed to the Kentucky Legislature that Confederate forces, in considerable numbers, had invaded Kentneky and are occupying and fortifying their positions at Hickman's and Chalk Bluffs .-This r. M. received reply to his message, with one from Gov. Harris of Tennessee to Gov. Magoffin, that it had been referred to a special committee.

Harris' message says the troops that landed at Hickman last night did so without his knowledge or consent, and is confident without the consent of Davis. He telegraphed him, requsting their immediate withdrawal,

Gen. Grant, with two regiments of infastry, one company of light artillery, and two guaboats, took possession of Paducah, Ky, on the 4th, and found secession flags flying in expectation of the arrival of a Southern army, which was reported, 3,800 strong, sixteen miles distant.

The loyal citizens tore down the seession flags on the arrival of our troops .-Gen Grant took possession of the telegraph office, depot and marine hospital, and found the rations of the Southern army. He issued a proclamation, saying he came among them, not as an enemy, but as a friend and fellow citizen; not to injure and annoy them, but to respect them, defend and enforce the rights of loyal citizens.

It has been determined by the Government to hold the position of Fr Hatteras, although the original intention was to destroy and abandon the works, but now it will be made a rendezvous for the army and naval forces. This expedition is but the communicement of operations of which the Naval Department has made ample preparations, and will be rapidly developed.

The Rebels had abandoned their strong-Ir fortified fort at Ocraroke Iulet. Multi tudes of the North Carolinians had demonstrated loyalty by taking the oath of alleglance at Ft. Hatteras. The oath was administered to as many as 200 or 300 in a
