Model Resatutions.

Previous to the recent election in Maine, the anti-coercion Democrats, who are callad Disunionists there and elsewhere, held a feeble caucus at Bangor, on the same day appointed for a Union mass meeting. A bit of a row was anticipated, but happily did not occur. The Republicans and Unon Democrats, who, like sensible men, are not ashamed to call one another brethren, as they are in other quarters, held a big meeting, and among other resolutions passed the following:

Resolved, That we will stand by the Union, and maintain the Union, and not a grain of sand belonging to the Union hall ever be surrendered to foes abroad or rebels at home, and the union of Union men for the sake of the Union is the unchangeable will of the Democrats and Reablicans of Penobscot.

Resolved, That the Republicans and Democrats of Penobscot are a band of brothers in this terrible crisis of the country's history, and politicians of every hue and dre are requested to dry up until the Stars and Stripes float again in security over every portion of the Union.

WHAT ILLINOIS HAS DONE .- We learn from the Adjutant General's office that Illinois has now in the field twenty-nine regments of infantry, two of cavalry and deren companies of artillery. There are now organized twenty more regiments, some of which will be in the field in a few days. Since Gov. Yntes issued his last proclamation, over one kundred and seventy companies have been tendered. This is long about as well as any State in the

New York Canala.-The tolls of the New York canals for the financial year ending with this month, have been \$3,-356,892, an increase of \$985,521 over 1860, and of \$1,552,460; or an aggregate of \$2,537,981 for the two years -- equal to the proceeds of a tax of one and threefourths mills. The Albany Journal says that there will not at present, be any occasion for the imposition of taxes to meet the interest on the public debt, or to reinburse any principal that may fall due this

KENTUCKY .- Gov. Magoffin, of Kenticky, vetoed the bill passed by the Legslature calling on Gen. Anderson to take command, at once, of the Kentucky volunteers and expel the Confederate troops from the State. The veto did no harm, however, for the House instantly repassed the bill by a two-thirds vote, and the Senate did likewise. If it is unfortunate for Kestucky that she has a Disunion Goverme, it is couply fortunate that she has a stanch Union Legislature.
