

Notes on Sacred History—According to tradition, Damascus is built on the spot where Cain killed Abel. Mount Ararat, in Armenia, when seen from afar, and in a certain position, has in its summit a striking resemblance to a ship. The whole country around is full of traditions respecting Noah and the Ark. The Garden of Gethsemane, the scene of the Saviour's passion, is about a third of an acre in extent, and surrounded by a low wall. The garden is planted with olive, almond and fig trees. Eight of the olive trees are said to have been in existence ever since the time of Christ, and it is considered sacrilege to pluck their leaves. The "Potter's field" bought for thirty pieces of silver, which was the price of the treason of Judas, was examined in 1836. A cave was discovered filled with skulls, evidently not of Jews but of foreigners. The initials "J. H. S." (Jesus Hominum Salvator) were invented by St. Bernardine in the XIVth century. After the plague in Siena he travelled the country, putting up the letters wherever he went. Certain ancient Jewish authorities say that Noah, or his forefather, Seth, was informed by Adam that the world was to perish, once by water, and a second time by fire. Two pillars were then erected, one of stone against the water, and the other of brick against the fire; and upon these pillars were engraved all such learning as had been delivered to or inherited by mankind. By these means all knowledge was not lost at the flood, as one of these pillars remained and was seen by Josephus.

THE WAY TO HEAVEN.—The way to Heaven is just as short from the battle field, from an enemy's prison, from any port in India, or Europe, or America, as it is from the sanctuary; and it is as easy to get to Heaven from any of these as it is from the House of God; because the way to Heaven is the Mediator, who covers space, who bears the publican's first cry, and sees the Magdalen's only tear, receives the criminal's last breath, and to whom the heart beats in prayer when the lips cannot speak, and who hears the dying soldier's and the dying sailor's cry, when no noise is heard by flesh and blood, save the terrible din of the battle field. What a magnificent religion is Christianity, for all circumstances, for all times.

AN INCIDENT.—A Virginian applied to Col. Gordon at Harper's Ferry for a pass, and as the press of business made it necessary for each applicant to furnish his own for the Colonel's signature, the Virginian was asked for his. He modestly said he had "no larin," and couldn't write one himself; whereupon Col. Gordon, to his surprise, handed him over to a negro servant from Massachusetts, who wrote the pass. This is not very wonderful, for it is a fact that a much larger proportion of the colored people in New England can read and write than of all the white population alone in Virginia, or in all the slave States taken together.
