GOOD NEWS!

Mason and Slidell Caught! LOYALTY IN NORTH CAROLINA: We are obliged to Wm. Dierdorf, Esq., for the following dispatch, brought by last night's stage from York:

N. Y., Nov. 21.—Immediately after the receipt of the news of the capture of Slidell and Mason, Messrs. Gwin, Denham and Brent were re-arrested and brought to Ft. Lafayette, where they are now kept in close confinement.

Delegates of four or five counties of N. Carolina met in convention at Ft. Hatteras and organized a provisional government.—They declared their loyalty to the Government of the United States, repudiated secession, and ordered a special election of members of Congress. They elected Nash Taylor Governor, and then adjourned subject to the call of the president of the convention.

The Canada papers are very severe on our Government on account of the capture of Mason and Slidell. The Toronto Leader says the best government on earth will not allow such an insult to go unpunished.

The report is confirmed that 4000 of our troops had invaded the eastern shore of the Potomac and were opposed by 1800 rebels.

Part of Hunter's army in Mo. had arrived at St. Louis; the other part is in Sedalia. Gen. Halleck has arrived at St. Louis.

Port Royal and Beaufort will be declared open ports by the Government.

The Government is highly elated at the capture of Mason and Slidell.

Johnson has concentrated his army at Centerville, and very few troops are at Manassas.
