

**THE CHINESE WALL.** — A curious circumstance connected with the construction of the great wall of China is narrated by Capt. Parrish, who accompanied Lord Macartney to China. It seems to show that two thousand years ago the Chinese used wall guns, or some firearms of that kind. Speaking of embrasures in the great wall, which was built about 221 B.C., he observes: The soles of the embrasures were pierced with small holes, similar to those used in Europe for the reception of swivels or wall-pegs. The holes appear to be part of the original construction of the wall, and it appears difficult to assign to them any other purpose.
