FROM THE MINES.—A few persons from the mines came down on the Julia and about \$30,000 in gold dust, mostly in the hands of passengers. Mr. Rogers had arrived at the Dalles direct from Colville and brought down about \$6,000 in dust from that place.

Mr. Petty arrived from Oro Fino two weeks ago and reports 28 inches of snow at that place and plenty of grub for the miners. He also says that a large number had come back there from the Salmon mines intending to winter at Oro Fino. He also saw three men at Craig's direct from Salmon who suffered much from the cold, their feet having been severely frost bitten. These men reported much snow and severe cold weather in the mines when they left.

No snow at Lewiston and Wallula.—Times.

A man by the name of Wiser, from Benton county, took out \$5,600 in two days, in Balcon Gulch, Salmon river diggings. Provisions are very high at Oro Fino. Flour 30cts per pound; bacon, sugar and apples, 50cts per pound.

The assay office in this city has about as much business, most of the time, as it can do. The bars of gold that now come out of that office show what our fields are doing in the mines.—Oregonian.

MORE DISCOVERIES.—Gold discoveries have been made about 100 miles East and South from Colville, of exceeding richness. The gold is very coarse. Two men formerly connected with the British Boundary Commission were the discoverers, and they alone are the persons who now know the precise locality.—Times.
