**Ordinances Granting Right of Way, &c.**

Be it ordained and established by the City Council of Oregon City, That W. C. Dement, D. P. Thompson, A. L. Lovejoy, and their successors, be and they are hereby granted the right of way for a railroad through the center of Main Street and either of the cross streets, to any boat landing not under and held by virtue of a license, and to hold said grant for the term of ten years; provided, that in the use of any of said landings, they shall conform to the requirements of the City Council Ordinance No. 44, respecting the puncturing and granting of license to keep a warehouse, wharf, or wharf boat at any of the boat landings in Oregon City; and provided further, that the rails for said road shall be laid as far as may be in no way to obstruct any part of said street, rendering the crossing at any place upon said road easy and convenient for teams and wagons, the rails crossing the crosswalks to be on a level with the surface of said walk, by cutting the boards so as to let said rail road, and on a level therewith, and firmly making said rails down to 4x4 timbers. On that part of Main Street immediately above the rail road, the rail road may be laid in any place beyond the necessary space for loading and unloading. The charge per ton for carrying freight open or closed and rail road, within the city limits, shall not exceed fifty cents. Said rail road to be completed within three years from the date hereof; or otherwise forfeit said grant. Noticing herein contained to be so concerned as to prevent the granting of the right of way to any person or persons, at any subsequent time, for a breakwater canal, and right of banks, encompassing what is known as the upper landing of said city, and running there in a straight direction, towards Canemah to the southward of the corporation, and across said lands at any place necessary to make a permanent improvement and improvement to be commenced within the year 1862, and be completed within three years from the first day of Jan. 1865, or otherwise forfeit his grant.
