

Henry Clay on Rebellion.
 If any one State, or any portion of the people of any State, choose to place themselves in array against the Government of the Union, I am for trying the strength of this Government, I am for ascertaining whether we have a Government or not—practicable, efficient, capable of maintaining its authority and upholding the powers and interests which belong to a Government.—Nor, sir, am I to be alarmed or dissuaded from any such course by intimations of the spilling of blood. If blood is to be spilt, by whose fault is it to be spilt? Upon the supposition, I maintain, it will be the fault of those who choose to raise the standard of division, and endeavor to prostate the Government. And, sir, when that is done, so long as it pleases God to give me a voice to express my sentiments, or an arm, weak and enfeebled as it may be by age, that voice and that arm will be on the side of my country, for the support of the general authority, and for the maintenance of the Powers of the Union.—[Speech of Henry Clay, August 1st, 1850.]
