

Henry Clay on Rebellion. "If any one State, or any portion of the people of any State, choose to place themselves in array against the Government of the Union, I am for trying the strength of this Government, I am for ascertaining whether we have a Government or not—practicable, efficient, capable of maintaining its authority and upholding the powers and interests which belong to a Government.—Nor, sir, am I to be alarmed or dissuaded from any such course by intimations of the spilling of blood. If blood is to be spilt, by whose fault is it to be spilt? Upon the supposition, I maintain, it will be the fault of those who choose to raise the standard of disunion, and endeavor to prostrate the Government. And, sir, when that is done, so long as it pleases God to give me a voice to express my sentiments, or an arm, weak and enfeebled as it may be by age, that voice and that arm will be on the side of my country, for the support of the general authority, and for the maintenance of the Powers of the Union.—[Speech of Henry Clay, August 1st, 1850.]

A Sudden Change.—A Mercet correspondent of the Stockton Independent writes as follows, concerning a change in sentiment which is noticed in other localities beside that of Mercet: Men, who two months ago, were blatant traitors, thirsting for Yankee blood, and the burden of whose song was the ability of the South to whip the North, have become as mild and harmless as doves, and solemnly talk of a reconstruction of the Union. The few compromise persons (they are not men) we had here last Fall, have nearly all disappeared. The most of them claim to be Union now. If the punishment in the next world is in proportion to the deeds done down here, won't they get a particularly warm corner?

Col. Corcoran is still detained by the rebel authorities at Richmond. Is it not time that our Government should exact his release? Rebel officers by scores are allowed their parole, while one of our bravest and best is treated as a felon. It is time this villainous detention of Corcoran should cease. To see traitor prisoners at large, feted by sympathizing friends, while Corcoran is kept in confinement, is enough to make a loyal man gnash his teeth.—St. Louis Democrat.
