FROM THE UPPER COLUMBIA AND THE MINES.—A. Leland writes to the Times, from Salmon River, 10th inst., and says there is no discount upon the richness of last fall. Some of the claims yield as high as 100 ounces a day to the rocker. Pack trains now get into Florence City. Bacon is selling at 50 cents a pound, and flour at \$20 per cwt.

At Lewiston, beef sells at 35c, mutton 50c, bacon 30c, flour 16c. Prices range as the steamer arrives. Meals at the restaurants, \$1; board \$14 a week. Thousands of animals and prospectors come and leave daily. Lewiston is improving. Lumber is worth \$100, green, at Robie's saw-mill, and \$150 delivered from Craig's mill, seasoned. Lots are for sale at \$100 to \$600. About \$175,000 in gold dust came to Portland last Monday from Salmon River. Several disappointed and dissatisfied miners also came down. Miners from Powder River were returning—water too high to give the mines a fair trial. About 40 miners are working at the mouth of Spokane River, making \$5 to \$20 a day.

All the advices from the mines go to show that it is yet too early for mining.

Items.—Mr. Strong has commenced work on the telegraph line, at Portland. The poles are going up at the rate of one mile a day.

At last accounts the snow at Powder River was from 3 to 4 feet deep. A party shoveling its way in, met another party trying to shovel out.

The dwelling of Elijah Williams, Polk co., was burned lately. Loss about \$700. Blankets made at Salem sell at \$6.50, and as high as \$10, a pair.

The Broderick monument at San Francisco, in Lone Mountain Cemetery, including the statue, is to cost \$11,000.

The Sierra Nevada made the run from San Francisco to Portland, last trip, in 70 hours and 10 minutes—quickest time yet.

Andrew J. Pate, the murderer of Hale, will be hung at Albany next Tuesday, 27th.

Sen.—Representatives were present from Pacific No. 2, Dallas No. 20, Liberty No. 23, Sweet Home No. 34. W. Cranston was appointed P. G. W. P. pro tem. The following named ladies were admitted as visitors: Mrs. Mary Kightlinger, of Pacific No. 2, Mrs. W. H. Teal, Mrs. Hutchinson, Mrs. Shreve, Mrs. Lafollet, Misses Robinson and Clark, of Dallas No. 20; Mrs. W. R. Dunbar and Doll Dunbar of Liberty No. 23. A. S. Kightlinger and Samuel Teal were introduced and initiated. Several resolutions were adopted, among them one authorizing Jacob Mendenhall, J. L. Cleary, Wm. Gillam, and R. O. Dunbar to set as D. G. W. P. east of the mountains this season, and one thanking the publishers of the Sentinel and the Argus for favors.
