

EFFECTS OF SLAVERY.—The Boston Post, which has ever been, and is now, anything but an anti-slavery paper, in a late issue speaks as follows on the effects of slavery upon a community:

Sail down the back of the Potomac alone and you pass land enough, untilled, to settle all Ireland in. Surely slavery, while it is legal, is also a legal evil to the South, for poor men cannot settle on those shores without slave labor, and poor men cannot buy slaves; for this reason are these lands left unilled. Internal improvements will never be seen in the South until the South uses free and white labor. Slavery fosters aristocracy; even the very slaves partake of the aristocracy; they will do nothing save as the mill-horse treads his daily number of steps and sleeps his allotted number of hours. You will have the tobacco grown and cotton and sugar cultivated as usual, for the "boss" needs them; but you will have no highways built—noting but the everlasting mud pipe. No manufactory established. Civilization clears not the forest here as it advances. Progress waits by the wayside for the white man's coming; for his labor, energy and interest in his own toil. Hope of reward sweetens labor, but to the white man alone is given the faculty and endurance, with the desire to toil, even when he knows it is for posterity or the benefit of mankind—he labors instinctively and thus blesses his children's children.

RELICS OF A FORMER RACE.—A correspondent of the Stockton Republican writing about Dr. Snell's Museum in Sonora, says:

A relic of some former race, who inhabited California at a very remote period, was pointed out to me, found in a tunnel which was run in the side of Table Mountain 2,000 feet, which had evidently been wrought by the hands of man, the material being hematite of iron. There was a hole pierced through its centre, which, when brought to Dr. Snell, was filled with hematite. Many other antique specimens of manufacture were shown me, some of which presented a singular appearance, differing materially from those now in use by the Indians of California. Stone mortars, bowls, dishes and scoops had been brought him by the miners who found them buried deep "into the bowels of the earth."
