AMERICAN AFFAIRS IN CANADA .- Not long since in the Canadian Parliament, a bill was introduced requiring the organization of the militia, for the purpose of being prepared to defend themselves against the United States. On that occasion, Col. Arthur Rankin, a member of the same body, (and who offered his services to our Government, and was commissioned a Colonel in the Union army, but resigned at the time of the Trent difficulty,) made a powerful speech against the bill, in the course of which he said;

"A moment's real reflection, Mr. Speaker, ought to be sufficient to convince every bonorable member that such a law never could have been carried out; its provisions were oppressive in the extreme, and to enforce them would have been an impossibility. Sir, for us to talk of placing Canada in a state of defense against the power of the United States Government, is as ridie ulous as it would be for a mouse to assume an attitude of defense toward an elephant The army of that nation is but little inferior in discipline to the best armies of Europe; it is superior in intelligence to any army in the world; it is as well armed and equipped as the army of any European power; it is maintained at the cost of a daily expenditure greater than the yearly cost of even such an organization as that proposed by the late government, and in case of emergency, its numbers, now ex-ceeding half a million, can be doubled --Such being the power of our republican neighbors, it is obvious that for us to talk of defending ourselves against the government of that country, if disposed to attack us, is simply absurd But, Mr. Speaker, we have no cause for apprehension. In the first place. I don't believe there is any illfeeling towards us as Canadians, in the United States, or, if there is such a feeling, it is because we are connected with Britain; and not on our account."

There is great force in the sentiments contained in this extract, especially in the concluding paragraph. The bill to put Canada in a state of defense, failed on the second reading.
