Notice To Donation Claimants in Oregon. The sixth section of the Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to reduce the expenses of the Survey of the Public Lands in the United States, approved May 20th, 1862, is as follows: "Section 6. And be it further enacted, That from and after the first day of July next the compensation of Registers and Receivers in all the Land Offices in the United States shall be an annual salary of five hundred dollars to each, with the fees and commissions now prescribed by law and, to be paid by claimants, an additional fee in donation cases of five dollars for each final certificate for one hundred and sixty acres, ten dollars for three hundred and twenty acres, and fifteen dollars for six hundred and forty acres." In view of the above enactment, and to have the order in which we think it best for the work of the office to proceed understood, we now say to the donation claimants of the Townships herewith designated that we shall proceed to make out the certificates of such of those claimants as are disposed to take the prescribed oath of loyalty, and pay for their certificates.
