

THE LEGISLATURE.

SENATE.—Mr. Drew offered the following resolution:
Resolved, That the Committee on Federal Relations be requested to institute inquiries in order to enable them to report to the Senate what means have been adopted by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue of the Treasury Department of the United States to supply the citizens of this State with the stamps required to be used on and after the 1st of October, 1862, by article 12th of the National Tax Law. Resolution passed.

M'Bride moved to refer certain portions of ex-Governor Whiteaker's message to an appropriate committee. Carried.

HOUSE.—Petition presented by Wasserman from citizens of Multnomah, praying for the carrying out of the provision of the constitution, preventing the ingress of negroes and Chinamen. Referred to Committee on Judiciary.

Dufur presented a petition of Wm. King, asking for indemnification for contract in supplying penitentiary with stone, etc. Referred to Committee on Claims.

Smith, of Linn, presented a petition asking for the passage of law regulating the rate of interest and punishing usury.

Petitions from nearly every county in the State have been sent to their respective members on this subject.

Collard moved that this whole matter be referred to the Committee on Judiciary. It was so referred.

Committee on Corporations reported bill to amend charter of Oregon City so as to prevent persons from voting who have not paid their taxes from neglect or who refuse to pay them when demanded; also to enable the city to work its criminals upon the roads and public buildings.

Also a bill to incorporate the city of Auburn, in Baker county. The corporate limits to embrace one mile square. Passed to second reading.

Report of Committee to which was referred joint resolution calling upon the Government to furnish us with a complement of arms, the establishment of an arsenal and gunboat for the protection of our State, to be stationed at the Columbia River Bar, was adopted.

SENATE.—Fitzhugh introduced a bill to prevent the immigration of negroes and mulattoes into the State. Read first time.

Chrisman introduced a bill to increase the jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace from \$100 to \$500.

Also, an act to change the name of Lane county to Clay county. Read first time.

HOUSE.—Gillette introduced a bill to reduce the salaries of certain officers of Clatsop county, which was referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

Gillette presented a petition from the people of Clatsop county asking the name of the county changed to Astor, which was referred to committee on counties.

Smith offered a petition from the people of Albany asking for an act of the Legislature declaring the Calapooia navigable up to certain mills—which was referred to a special committee of three, composed of Smith, Helmigway, and Brown.

Moore, of the select committee to which was referred the bill for an appropriation of two hundred dollars for newspapers, postage stamps, &c., reported the bill back to House. The report was accepted.

Mallory, on leave of the House, introduced a bill to appropriate one thousand dollars to obtain one hundred copies of the reports of the Supreme Court of the State.

Cummins introduced a bill for the relief of Mr. Waterfield, which was referred to a select committee of three, being Humason, Cummins, and McCully.

Applegate introduced a bill to generalize a special act relating to swine running at large.

On motion the bill was rejected.

Gillette introduced a bill relating to a change in the corporation act of the town of Astoria.

Gillette introduced a bill to encourage the growth of oysters. Which was referred to a special committee, being Fay, Gillette, and Smith.

Humason offered a joint resolution requiring the Code Commission to report to a joint committee composed of the judiciary committee of both houses. The resolution was adopted.

Kearns introduced a bill relating to the collection of taxes. Referred to the judiciary committee.

Dufur proposed that the name of Mr. Wilcox be added to the committee on Fees. Accepted.

Dufur introduced a bill to prevent accidents on the highway.

Haines introduced a bill to establish the salaries of county judges.

Ed. As Butler is hanging such men as Jo Lane, we would be satisfied to see the name of the county changed to Butler. Any other name will do, however.

A Plan to aid of the Sanitary Commission.

Mr. EOROS: The ladies of Oregon City, who met at Mr. Whitlock's, in response to the call in your paper of last week, were unanimous in the opinion and resolve that some extra effort should be made, and that continuously, to raise funds for the relief of our sick and wounded soldiers; and the object of this communication is to lay before your readers throughout Clackamas county the result of their deliberations. The ladies suggest—

1st. That an association be formed embracing all the ladies and gentlemen of the county, who are willing to give, from time to time, according to their ability, such sums of money, or articles of needlework, of farm produce, or indeed anything which may be sold, to constitute a fund in aid of our suffering soldiers.

2d. That association to be called the "Clackamas County Association in Aid of the Sanitary Commission."

3d. That fund, and indeed all the arrangements, to be under the control of a Board of Managers, a Treasurer, and a Secretary who shall be elected at the first public meeting of the Association, by vote of the majority of the members present. Notices of this meeting may be expected in the Argus of the next week's issue.

4th. A true and faithful record to be kept of each donation, whether in money or other articles, with the names of all donors; and at suitable periods an acknowledgment to be made through the columns of the Argus.

5th. Persons to become members of this association by subscribing to the following proposition: "We feel interested in the work now being done by the Sanitary Commission for the comfort of our sick and wounded soldiers, and will gladly aid them by our contributions; and we do therefore pledge ourselves to give, from time to time, money or other articles, according to our judgment and convenience may direct, so long as these charities may be justly demanded at our hands."

Ladies who are interested will volunteer their services to solicit subscriptions, but it is earnestly requested that all who read this call, both gentlemen and ladies, especially if they be beyond the city limits, will prevent the necessity of a visit by sending in their names, at once, to either of the ladies whose names are appended hereto.
