

Washington, Sept. 26.—The Governors of Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Virginia, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, New Hampshire, and Indiana, arrived this morning from Altoona. The Governors had an interview with the President, and presented an address expressing—

First. A cordial personal official respect for the President.

Second. A determination under all circumstances, to support and maintain the President's constitutional authority. The Governors there speaking for themselves and the people of their respective States.

Third. Pledging to the President their aid in all measures calculated to bring the war to an early termination, but which should be prosecuted to ultimate victory, until the rebels return to their constitutional duty.

Fourth. Congratulating the President upon the proclamation of Emancipation, believing it will be productive of good as a measure of justice to humanity and sound policy.

The Governors were courteously and kindly received, and their suggestions listened to with close attention by the President.

It is stated by those who had the best opportunity of knowing, that no proposition was made at the recent Conference at Altoona, nor even a suggestion ventured, touching the removal of McClellan; nor was any proposition or suggestion made to promote Fremont to the head of the army or as to its future disposal.

The general address to the President, as agreed to, was written by Gov. Andrew at the suggestion of the Governors present. Gov. Bradford alone did not sign the address, expressing a fear that the proclamation for the emancipation of slaves might not prove so advantageous as the Conference hoped; and he regarded the matter as too doubtful to justify him in taking sides for its support.

A letter from Sandy Hook, Md., reports that the boats had arrived for the pontoon bridge for the temporary car-way to be thrown across the river for the passage of railroad trains, etc. Rumor says the rebels are at Winchester, and have commenced fortifying.

On the 13th, the gunboat Menona ran under the guns of Fort Morgan, below Mobile, and opened fire on the rebel steamer, damaging her greatly by the explosion of 11 shells in her bow. Fort Morgan opened fire on the Menona, but she escaped uninjured.

Alexandria, Va., Sept. 26.—An engine from here yesterday proceeded as far as Bristow. We captured 16 freight cars found uninjured. No rebel troops were found in the vicinity. It was ascertained, on good authority, that trains were running night and day regular to Culpeper, bringing supplies to the enemy, which were conveyed in wagons via Front Royal to Winchester. The bridge over the Rapidan is rebuilt; that over the Rappahannock will be finished to-day. All engines and cars not completely destroyed, have been run off from stations above Bristow, and are now being used by the rebels.

Washington, Sept. 26.—The interview between the President and the Governors of States lasted three hours. Their recommendations all partook of the nature of friendly suggestions. Some of the subjects the President said, had already received Executive consideration, while others, being for the first time presented, were at the President's request reduced to writing, in order that they might meet the attention which their importance demanded.

Louisville, Sept. 26.—Clinton county Home Guards attacked Champ Ferguson's guerrillas a few days since, killing Ferguson and 15 others. Bragg's forces are reported at Middletown, twelve miles from there.

Louisville, Sept. 26.—Midnight—The city is quiet. The streets are blocked up all day with Buell's forces passing through to camping grounds in the vicinity. The markets are almost drained of the necessities of life, from the producer's supplies being kept back. Refugees are rapidly returning. Business is becoming quite active, but no liquor is allowed to be sold.

Baltimore, Sept. 27.—The American's correspondent at Sharpsburg, writing on the 24th, says: Since the rebels were driven over the Potomac, our forces have made frequent dashes across. A few days since one company of the 5th New York brought back five brass pieces. Yesterday, the 62d Pennsylvania crossed below Shepards-town and captured 400 rifles, marked "London, '62," and one 12-pounder of English manufacture.

The rebel pickets, in all cases, fall back

at our approach. The bulk of the rebels seem to remain along the Potomac. Our reconnaissances generally find them in strong force, and the smoke of their camp fires is seen opposite all the fords. These manifestations are not altogether to be trusted, as it is part of the rebel tactics to show the most activity where they have the least force, and it must be difficult to find their large army at a point so far from railroad connection. A suspension of picket firing across the river has been agreed upon.

Fortress Monroe, Sept. 25.—The Richmond Whig of the 24th says that reinforcements have reached Lee since the battle at Mansans, enough to replace his losses in the recent battles.

The yellow fever is at Wilmington, N. C., very malignant.

The Richmond Dispatch abounds with most unmitigated lies in regard to the battles in Maryland, and says that Lee repulsed McClellan on the 17th, pursued him on the 18th, and defeated him on the 19th.

All the rebel papers received here claim the recent battles as victories, and call upon the people not to believe one word contained in the Northern papers in regard to Northern successes.

Philadelphia, Sept. 27.—The Washington Star of yesterday says that our pickets occupy the country in Virginia three miles out from Harper's Ferry. It is evident that there will be a movement of McClellan's army as soon as it is properly supplied by the Quartermaster's Department. Our troops are in the best possible spirits, eager for the fray.

The rebels occupy Warrenton with a single regiment. This is the nearest point to Washington at which they have a force of that size.
