

Details of Eastern News.

New York, Sept. 27.—New Orleans advices give an order by Gen. Butler, requiring foreign residents at that department to report to the Provost Marshal.

Cairo, Sept. 27.—The steamer Eugene was fired into by guerrillas at Randolph (Tenn.) on Wednesday.

St. Louis, Sept. 27.—The Military Commission for the trial of Gen. McKinstry has allowed the proceedings to be reported in the newspapers.

New York, Sept. 27.—The Times has news from Winchester on Wednesday, 24th. A large force of rebels were there, much demoralized and suffering for want of food.

Fortress Monroe, Sept. 29.—The Charleston Mercury, of the 25th, says there are grounds for believing that the enemy are sending heavy reinforcements to Hilton Head, and along the shore of Broad river.

The Richmond Examiner, of the 26th, says Bragg with 10,000 men is at Glasgow Junction, and that Rousseau has gone to meet him.

The Nashville Union regards the defeat of Bragg as certain, and says there are 200,000 Federal troops between Nashville and Louisville.

A bill passed the Confederate Congress, authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to issue copper coin of the denomination of 5, 10, and 25 cents, to the amount of \$5,000,000.

Washington, Sept. 30.—The following official report has been received by General Halleck:

At South Mountain our loss was 443 killed, 1,860 wounded and 76 missing. At Antietam, our killed numbered 2,610; wounded, 9,416; missing, 1,044.

Baltimore, Sept. 30.—Harper's Ferry is now held in large force by our troops and is evidently regarded as an important point.

Philadelphia, Sept. 29.—It is rumored that the existing quietude in the army is on account of Commissioners on the way from Confederate Congress to propose terms of peace, something like the loyal States to take all the Territories, Missouri, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Maryland, the cotton States to have a Congress of their own, to regulate domestic affairs only.

Chicago, Oct. 1.—The rumor that rebel Commissioners are on the way from Richmond to treat for peace is probably sensational, and was telegraphed by mistake.

Cincinnati, Sept. 30.—Gen. Morgan left Cumberland Gap two weeks ago, and is supposed to be marching north easterly towards Portsmouth, Ohio.

New York, Sept. 30.—27,000 troops have left the city, but their destination is not stated. A Washington letter doubts the rumor about Lee making a serious movement.

The Star intimates Heintzelman is in a position to intercept a movement of the rebel army towards Richmond.

San Francisco, Sept. 29.—Some employees of the Gas Company are to be prosecuted for attempting to remove a meter from cigar shop, the proprietor having insisted on paying his gas bill in Treasury Notes.

The Stamp Act goes into operation on Wednesday, but no stamps have been received in this State.

Hiram Clark, of the firm of Abernethy,

A patriotic mass meeting at Watsonville yesterday, contributed \$1,750 to the fund. Oct. 1.—Contributions to the patriotic fund are coming in briskly from the interior.
