

Union Meeting in Salem.

The members of both branches of the Legislative assembly, and other citizens of the State, met in the Hall of the House of Representatives at Salem, on Saturday evening, Oct. 11th, 1862, for the purpose of appointing a Union State Central Committee, and to transact any business necessary to perfect such organization.

The meeting was called to order by E. L. Applegate.

On motion of Mr. Humason, of Wasco Co., Mr. Hovey, of Benton, was called to the chair, and Mr. Gillette, of Clatsop, was elected Secretary.

By request of the Chair, Mr. Humason stated the object of the meeting.

Hon. B. F. Harding addressed the meeting, after which Mr. Mitchell, of Multnomah county, moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That a State Central Committee be appointed to serve till the meeting of the next State Union Convention, and that such committee be composed of one member from each county in this State.

After discussion, the resolution was unanimously adopted.

On motion of Mr. Reed, of Marion county, the members of the Legislative Assembly of each county nominated the members of the committee for the several counties, who were duly elected by the meeting, as follows:

Monteith; Marion, J. H. Moore; Polk, Isaac H. Butler; Yamhill, Geo. H. Stewart; Clackamas, D. P. Thompson; Multnomah, T. H. Pearce; Wasco, Wm. Lorenz; Umatilla, R. C. Combs; Baker, J. M. Kirkpatrick; Washington, T. R. Cornelius; Columbia, John Watts; Clatsop, Jas. Taylor; Tillamook, C. H. Davidson.

Mr. Harding moved the following resolution.

Resolved, That each member of the Central Committee residing in counties where there is no Union organization, be requested to act as county committee man, to call precinct meetings and county conventions, until the meeting of a Union County Convention.

On motion of Mr. Applegate, proceeded to elect a chairman of the Central Committee, which resulted in the choice of J. H. Moore, of Marion county.

Mr. Applegate offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we, as members of the Union organization, re-endorse the resolutions adopted by the Union Convention held at Eugene City, April 7th, 1862.

Mr. Wasserman offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we endorse the administration of President Lincoln in its efforts to crush out the rebellion, and that we have full confidence in its ability to conduct the war to a successful issue.

Messrs. A. C. Gibbs, R. P. Boise, E. L. Applegate, and J. R. McBride, being called, address the meeting.
