Harper's Ferry, Nov. 1st.—A force under French and Sedgwick left here this morning, crossing Shenandoah bridge...

A heavy reconnaissance yesterday in the direction of Charlestown and Shepards-town, found the enemy in large force at the former place.

A reconnaissance from Perceville discovered the enemy in large force near Paris and Upperville, under Longstreet.

Gen. Lee is still at Winchester, while the main body of his army is at Blue mountains. Smoker's gap is strongly defended by the enemy. Gen. Baruside is steadily moving on.

The impression is that the enemy's flank is turned, and a battle is imminent. Our position there is admirably defended. If the enemy attempts to cross a battle must ensue.

Cairo, Nov. 1st.—The rebels seem to be coming up by way of Grand Junction. They were in position to menace both Bolivar and Corinth.

By the stage yesterday afternoon we have a little more news.

Leesburg has been occupied by our forces without opposition. Our advance parties are driving the rebels before them in the direction of Richmond.

Some Texans are sending their slaves to Cuba.

Sabine Pass has been captured by our forces—including one fort, two camps, and ten rebel vessels, which were burned.

There is a report by way of rebel prisoners that Mobile has been taken by our squadron.

The Rebels Arming their Negroes.

New York, Oct. 27.—The Times Washington special dispatch says: "We have intelligence from the South, through a source entitled to credit, that the rebels have really ventured upon the dangerous policy of arming their negroes. In Atlanta, Georgia; Montgomery, Alabama, and other places, it is said that negro regiments have already been organized and supplied with weapons. Recent North Carolina newspapers state that about eight thousand black soldiers, officered by white men, have been sent from camps of instruction to garrison the fortifications of important towns."

WEALTH OF OHIO.—The Cincinnati Gazette says that the surplus product of Ohio for this year will exceed the interest on one thousand millions of dollars, and will exceed the interest on the National debt made by the war, in the year from its commencement.

THANKSGIVING.—Gov. Gibbs has appointed Thursday, Nov. 27th, as a day of Thanksgiving and Prayer.
