Details of Eastern News

The Philadelphia (Va.) correspondent of the Philadelphia Inquirer, under date of Nov. 26th, says: The presumption is that in a very few days we will have a battle in this vicinity that will eclipse all others of the war in regard to ferocity and fierceness.

Louisville, 28th.—An order has been issued by Gen. Boyle to the effect that all commanding officers of this department shall not permit negro slaves to enter their camps, and all officers and men are forbidden to interfere or intermeddle with slaves in any way.

Washington, 28th.—Major General McDowell's Court of Inquiry promises to be of long continuance. Nearly all the documents called for by him have been furnished.

Chicago, 28th.—A correspondent of the Boston Traveller, writing from on board the transport Baltic, in Hampton Roads, under date of Nov. 20th, states that that vessel was under orders to sail on the following Monday.

New York, Nov. 28.—Of the steamers which were recently built for the rebels on the river Clyde, one was lost on her trial trip, a second has just been wrecked near Havana, and a third is supposed by the Charleston papers to be lost.

Mallock on McClellan. HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY, WASHINGTON, Oct. 25th.

To Hon. E. M. Stanton, Sec'y of War.—Sir: In reply to the general interrogatory contained in your letter of yesterday I have the honor to report: First, That requisitions for supplies to the army under Maj. Gen. McClellan are made by his staff officers on the chiefs of bureaus here; that is, the Quartermaster applies for his Chief Quartermaster on the Quartermaster General; for commissary supplies by his Chief Commissary on the Commissary General, etc.

Second, On several occasions Gen. McClellan has telegraphed me that his army was deficient in certain supplies. All these telegrams were immediately referred to heads of bureaus, with orders to report. There has not been, so far as I could ascertain, any neglect or delay in any department or bureau in issuing all the supplies asked for by Gen. McClellan, or by the officers, or by his staff.

Third, Soon after the battle of Antietam, Gen. McClellan was urged to give me information of his intended movements, in order that, if he moved between the enemy and Washington, the reinforcements could be sent from this place.

On the 1st of October, finding that he proposed to operate from Harper's Ferry, I urged him to cross the river at once, and give battle to the enemy, pointing out to him the disadvantages of delaying till the Autumn rains had swollen the Potomac and impaired the roads.

Fourth, In my opinion, there has been no such want of supplies in the army under Gen. McClellan as to prevent his compliance with my orders to advance upon the enemy. Had he moved his army to the south side of the Potomac, he could have received his supplies almost as readily as by remaining inactive on the north side.

Washington, Nov. 10.—The New York World's correspondent with the Army of the Potomac arrived in town today. He says that the mutiny so confidently predicted by McClellan's friends, has not taken place.

Since the battle of Antietam all the commanders of corps, except Gen. Fitz John Porter, inclusive of Franklin, have asked to be relieved from serving under McClellan. So have most of the officers of note in command of divisions and brigades. Hooker and Hunter have also expressed unwillingness to serve under McClellan.

Notice To Donation Claimants in Oregon. The sixth section of the Act of Congress entitled An Act to reduce the expenses of the Survey of the Public Lands in the United States, approved May 30th, 1862, is as follows:

SECTION 6. And be it further enacted, That from and after the first day of July next the compensation of Registers and Receivers in all the Land Offices in the United States shall be an annual salary of five hundred dollars to each, with the fees and commissions now prescribed by law and, to be paid by claimants, an additional fee in donation cases of five dollars for each final certificate for one hundred and sixty acres, ten dollars for three hundred and twenty acres, and fifteen dollars for six hundred and forty acres.

In view of the above enactment, and to have the order in which we think it best for the work of the office to proceed understood, we now say to the donation claimants of the Townships herewith designated that we shall proceed to make out the certificates of such of those claimants as are disposed to take the prescribed oath of loyalty, and pay for their certificates.

Persons who live at a distance from this Office can take the oath before a Justice, having the Clerk of the proper county certify that the Justice was authorized at the time to administer oaths.
