Butler a felon, deserving capital punishment, and orders that he no longer be considered or treated as a public enemy, but as an outlaw and a common enemy of mankind, and when captured, the offi cers making the capture will instantly hang him. It is also ordered, that no commissioned officer of the United States taken shall be released or paroled until Butler shall have met punishment for his crimes.
