PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

EXECUTIVE OFFICE, PORTLAND, OREGON, J. 15, 1863.

By the President of the United States, through Brigadier General George Wright, commanding the Department of the Pacific, and Brigadier General Benjamin Alfred, commanding the District of Oregon, I have been requested to raise six additional companies, required to complete the 1st Regiment of Cavalry, Oregon Volunteers. They will be needed the coming Spring on the frontiers of this State and Washington Territory, and for expedition against the Snake Indians, who have so long been menacingly engaged in robbing and murdering our fellow citizens. I consent that the entire of Oregon, which will furnish their own horses and horse equipments, may be undertaken. The men are in such case entitled to carry a day for the use and risk of their horses and horse equipments.

Each company will consist of one hundred enlisted men, and when mustered into the service of the United States to serve for three years, unless sooner discharged.

Recruiting offices will be immediately opened at Portland, Dallas City, and perhaps at other places.

To Donation Claimants in Oregon.

The sixth section of the Act of Congress entitled An Act to reduce the expenses of the Survey of the Public Lands in the United States, approved May 20th, 1852, is as follows:

"Section 6. And be it further enacted, That from and after the first day of July next the compensation of Registers and Receivers in all the Land Offices in the United States shall be an annual salary of five hundred dollars to each, with the fees and commissions now prescribed by law, and to be paid by claimants, an additional fee in donation cases of five dollars for each final certificate for one hundred and sixty acres, ten dollars for three hundred and twenty acres, and fifteen dollars for six hundred and forty acres."

In view of the above enactment, and to have the order in which we think it best for the work of the office to proceed understood, we now say to the donation claimants of the Townships herewith designated that we shall proceed to make out the certificates of such of those claimants as are disposed to take the prescribed oath of loyalty, and pay for their certificates. A reasonable time will be allowed within which to file request for certificates, complete proof, and take the oath. We shall then pass to other townships, and in this order call on all the Donation Claimants in our district.

Persons who live at a distance from this Office can take the oath before a Justice, having the Clerk of the proper county certify that the Justice was authorized at the time to administer oaths.
