

**RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.**—In a previous number, we offered some thoughts upon this very important subject. We recur to it now for the purpose of adding some additional words to Christian parents, as to their duty and responsibility in this behalf, as upon their fidelity so much depends.

Parents are presumed to feel a deeper interest in their children than any one else can feel. Whatever pertains to the character and prospects of children excites not only a lively interest, but an intense anxiety, in the bosom of every right-minded parent. And no one can be expected, without this powerful impulse, to use that diligence, patience, and perseverance which a proper religious education demands.

In addition to this, parents usually have an influence over their children which no other can exert. The very relationship existing between them authorizes this influence; and we find accordingly that it moulds, in a great degree, the sentiments, the character, and the destiny of children. This influence therefore may parents exercise in its full force for good. At least it is their own fault if it be diminished or lost.

Parents, moreover, have an opportunity of imparting a salutary instruction to their children, from their constant association with them in the most favorable circumstances. They preside over the tender years of their little ones, and can observe and direct every development of mind and morals. God has wisely ordered that during this critical and plastic age they are thrown upon the watchful care of parents. Having them thus at home, under their own immediate supervision, parents may exert an influence which is not hourly counteracted by evil associations.

How favorable then is the opportunity thus afforded to "train up a child in the way he should go!" And yet how many parents, for no stronger reason than to avoid the trouble, dismiss their children almost entirely to servants in their infancy, and to schoolmasters, or into the streets, as soon as they are well able to go alone! This is not only a heartless dereliction of duty, it is downright cruelty, of which no Christian should be guilty. Surely, such parents cannot complain if they finally pay for this ill-purchased ease in tears and unavailing grief over the premature infamy and ruin of their neglected children.

And this cruel neglect is necessarily accompanied, or followed, by a want of proper domestic discipline, without which mere instruction is of little avail. Children who are permitted to wonder at large, to choose their own associations, and to pursue their own wayward and pernicious courses, soon come to despise all rule and authority both human and divine. The very design, it would seem, of the domestic constitution is, to train children to a prompt and cheerful obedience to parental authority and control, enforcing the great principles of truth and righteousness. This habit of cheerful obedience to proper authority is to be enforced at all events—enforced firmly, but firmly and unremittingly from early infancy onward to maturity. It belongs to our fallen nature to cast off authority and to do as we please. Now this disposition should be early and thoroughly subdued. Without this all hope of respect and obedience to parents, or subordination to the divine law, is utterly void. To neglect it, therefore, is to rear every girl to be a vixen, or a termagant, and every boy to be a vagabond and an outlaw.

To the entire success of religious education, parental example is indispensable. If in their words and conduct parents disregard the lessons of the Bible, however much they may teach them otherwise, their children will soon learn to distrust the truth of what they are taught, and to despise it as a mere bugbear, employed to frighten them into obedience. It strikes them at an attempt to deceive them, and nothing has a more baleful influence. This parental instruction is neutralized by parental example; and not only so, under such influence children usually grow up into confirmed infidelity and irreligion. Whereas a living example of all the truths and virtues taught, would be a lesson never to be forgotten, bearing constant witness as well to the understanding as to the heart and conscience of the child.—*Oregon Chieftain*.
