Here he found some five hundred negroes doing nothing, and many of them suffering from want and sickness. He called them together and told them the Government was friendly to them, but it expected them to work for a living. He assured them that they should be protected against any of the outrages of which they complained; and then asked who of them were willing to return to their plantations. They told him that they did not wish to live in idleness; that they would be glad to go to work. None of them showed any reluctance to go to work on some Government plantations, though all showed an unwillingness to return to their old masters. Among them is the iron-clad Dietator, one of Ericsson's great steam frigates, three hundred and twenty feet in length, fifty feet in width, very sharp bow, and is expected to make twenty miles an hour. The Puritan is of the same size and model. The Roanoke is complete, and is designed for a mammoth harbor battery. The tremendous Ram, Dunderberg, is supposed to be invincible. Her length is three hundred and eighty feet, width seventy feet, and she is to be propelled by engines of 6,000 horse power. Her hull is almost a mass of solid timber, covered with five inch iron plates which extend six feet below the water line. All above the water line the sides are eight feet thick and the bow, for the distance of fifty-six feet from the extreme end, is a solid mass of wood, plated with iron.
