Washington, August 1.—Admiral Porter in a communication to the Navy Department, says I am sure of raising the De Kalb sink by explosion of torpedoes in the Yazzo sometime ago, but cannot say as yet what are her injuries. Cairo, Aug. 1.—A quantity of merchandise intended for rebels at Little Rock, was seized yesterday at Charleston, Mo.
