

Friday's Dispatch. New York, 22.—Herald has the following: Headquarters Army Potomac, 21st, information from different sources leads to the belief that the rebels are leaving our front and going to Richmond.

A complete panic prevails in Richmond to obtain greenbacks; many dealers will take no other money for what they sell. The Enquirer pitches into the Jew proclivities rough shod and classes Benjamin Seely of State as one of the kind.

Louisville, 22.—Nashville Union says information of reliable character confirms previously published reports of the demoralization of Bragg's army. Timpanians are especially aware of participating any further in the war.

Philadelphia, 23.—A letter dated on board the Flag Ship Demore, off Charleston, 18th, says the attack commenced day before yesterday morning at daylight by siege guns of Gen. Gilmore. At 6 o'clock Dahlgren proceeded on board the Weehawken, and with the New Ironsides and the entire Monitor fleet attacked batteries Wagner and Gregg with great fury, completely silencing Wagner, and almost silencing Gregg.

Memphis, August 21.—Steamer City of Madison was blown up at Vicksburg, on Wednesday, August 19th, while heading ammunition at the levee. About 60 lives were lost. The explosion was caused by careless handling percussion shells by a laborer.

Stevenson, Ala., 22.—Weller crossed Tennessee last evening and turned small railroad bridge near Shell Mound, thus severing communication between rebel right and left, in view of its tactical importance.

Richmond papers of the 19th, say yesterday the bombardment was more furious than any previous day. The Ironsides, 6 monitors, and 6 gunboats with all the cavalry's land batteries opened on Wagner at daybreak throwing 20 shells per minute at our works.

San Francisco, 24.—Steamship Oregon arrived last night from Magellan, Guyana, and other parts on the North western coast of Mexico. She brought \$114,286 in treasure and 256 packages etc.

New York, August 24.—Money easy at 6 1/2 per cent; gold unsettled, opening at 24 1/4, declining to 23 3/8, closing at 23 5/8; gov't stocks firm and unchanged.

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Memphis, 20.—Gen. Harbit started an expedition from Lagrange Tennessee on the 13th under command of Lieut. Col. Phillips of 9th Illinois mounted infantry, and reached Grenada on the 17th and driving Gen. Sherman (rebel) with 2000 men and 3 pieces of artillery from that place.

Fortress Monroe, Aug. 24.—Richmond Whip of 21st says loss of Vicksburg and falls at Gettysburg are the two events of the year which seem to render highly probable a long continuance of the war.

Fortress Monroe, 24th.—Governor Leitch has ordered rebel General Assembly of Virginia elected in May last to meet at Richmond in extra session on 7th of September for the purpose of devising means for the public defense.

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Cincinnati, 26.—Returns from 106 counties in Kentucky give Bramlette 50,692 majority. A Cairo dispatch says it is reported that Gen. Pemberton died last week at Selma, Alabama.

New York, 26.—Capt. of the brig South Boston reports that on the evening of the 22d in Lat. 37 Long. 74 he picked up a boat belonging to the U. S. S. R. L. bridge which contained a negro who stated that on the 21st during heavy gale he had perished and all on board but himself perished.
