

THE DIFFERENCE.—When the rebels sank vessels in Charleston harbor to keep out ships who had supplies for Fort Sumpter—all right said the rebels here. HOW THE VOTE STOOD.—The assembly on Friday adopted a series of resolutions pledging California's support to the Government in the prosecution of the war. There were but five votes. Thirty eight Republicans voted "aye," twenty-two Union Democrats voted "aye," and nine did not vote; and five Breckinridgers voted "no," and four did not vote. No Republican or Union Democrat voted in the negative; no Breckinridger in the affirmative. No one spoke against the resolutions; no Breckinridgers spoke at all.

IMPORTANT DECISIONS.—The Supreme Court of this State lately decided in the case of Oregon vs. Multnomah county, for the recovery of State tax, that the sums of money assessed and charged to the several counties of the State, constitute an intact fund, to be paid in full by the treasurers of such counties; that neither of the counties nor the treasurer can deduct anything therefrom for the centage or commission; that the counties, respectively, are solely liable for commissions on the State tax; and that the Secretary of State, ex-officio auditor, has no authority or right to pay commissions to the county treasurers upon the State tax.

THE THUNDERER.—The London Times tells the operatives of Manchester that a war with this country will set all the cotton mills humming on full time, but on the contrary such a war will bring starvation to their doors. We have been their best customer; we have furnished them with bread, and we have bought their goods. The first hostile gun fired, and the doors of commerce will be slammed in the face of insolent Britannia. Not a bushel of grain not a yard of cloth—shall cross the ocean. England is mighty; but let her beware how she goads a desperate people into retaliative conflict.—S. F. Herald.
