The tax list is made out and the books placed in the hands of the Treasurer, therefore any person wishing to pay his tax has only to call in at McClure's store, "pungle up," and get a receipt. The assessment is nine mills on the dollar, against eight mills last year. From the destruction of property, and depreciation in value, the assessment rolls fall short of last year about \$350,000. Then we want to collect a revenue off our secess citizens before their property is confiscated, to pay the debts incurred by them, through their chosen tools. Every good loyal man is willing to aid in getting out of debt, and every traitor should be made help, and we hope our collectors will use due diligence in collecting the taxes before the confiscation act is enforced.

There is an effort being made in our Legislature to impose a poll tax on dogs.
