NEW STEAMSHIP LINE.—The Moses Taylor, of the new line of steamers, sailed from San Francisco, on the 21st ult., with about 500 passengers. The price of passage by this line was, upper saloon, \$250; first cabin, \$200; after second cabin, \$175; forward second cabin, \$150; steerage, \$100. The mail line kept up about its old prices, and the St. Louis had 400 passengers.

J. Czapsky. When the application for the degree was made to the Faculty, it was accompanied by affidavits and testimonials to the effect that Dr. Czapsky was a regular graduate M. D. of the University of Pesti, had served as a surgeon in the Hungarian army, and was a regular practitioner of medicine. On the strength of these the degree was granted. The ad eundem degree, as its name implies, is conferred on graduates only, and gives us new privileges.
