J. Czupkay. When the application for the degree was made to the Faculty, it was accompanied by affidavits and testimonials to the effect that Dr. Czupkay, was a regular graduate M. D. of the University of Pesth, had served as a surgeon in the Hungarian army, and was a regular practitioner of medicine. On the strength of these the degree was granted. The academic degree, as its name implies, is conferred on graduates only, and gives us new privileges. Had there been the slightest suspicion of irregularity, the application would have been refused.
