Czapek. When the application of the degree was made to the Faculty, it was accompanied by affidavits and testimonials to the effect that Dr. Czapek was a regular graduate M. D. of the University of Pesth, and acted as surgeon in the Hungarian army, and was a regular practitioner of medicine. On the strength of these the degree was granted. The ad eundem degree, as its name implies, is conferred on graduates only, and gives no new privilege, liberty, or honor, and the slightest suspicion of irregularity, the application would have been refused.
